

# DePaul University "Sharing Information on Progress" Report

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DePaul University's Driehaus College of Business and Kellstadt Graduate School of Business originally became signatory to PRME on 14 September 2009, and we transitioned engagement to the University in December 2012, along with being a signatory at the University level of the Global Compact since 2006. The reason for this innovative commitment is because, in reviewing the Principles of PRME, we found that these also guided the educational Values and Mission of the University.

The series highlights micro lending and cottage industries in Bangladesh, health access in Tanzania, a millennium development village in Ghana, Syrian refugee camps in Jordan, food deserts, homelessness, recidivism in local jails, wage theft in America, and other contemporary topics of local and global interest. To date episodes have been shown on WNIT South Bend Indiana Public Television, and WTTW, Chicago Public Television.
